Juvenile Subcommittee

- Members: David Brickey, Pam Vickrey, Patrick Anderson, Chris Roach, Christina Zidow, Darin Carver, Ron Gordon, Judge Frost, Judge Johansen, Jennifer Valencia and Reg Garff. *Chris Roach chair
- Goals: 1) Revise Juvenile Sentencing Guidelines (prefatory language, consideration of aggravating and mitigating factors more appropriately within the matrix, and incorporation of sex offenses specifically); 2)
 Alternatives for sentencing youthful offenders up to age 25 (including blended sentences or other alternatives).
- Update: 2015 Juvenile Disposition Guidelines were published; addressed revisions to prefatory language; revisions to the matrix itself still pending; incorporation of sex offenses also still pending. SB167 addressed multiple issues characterized as addressing "overly aggressive prosecution" of juvenile offenders, stopping the "school to prison pipeline," and comprehensive reform referred to as "Juvenile Justice Reinvestment." JJS currently engaged with CSG in comprehensive reform efforts.

Justice Courts Subcommittee

- Goals: 1) Incorporation of evidence-based practices into the development of misdemeanor sentencing guidelines & 2) Accreditation and/or licensing requirements for treatment providers operating in justice courts.
- Update: Have begun development of misdemeanor sentencing guidelines; identifying nature of misdemeanor offenses warranting specific identification for imposition of jail time; developing recommendations for limited use of jail time for all others. HB348 addressed treatment provider certification and standards as well as less serious traffic offense re-categorization. SB115 & SB59 originated from this subcommittee.

Anomalies Subcommittee

- Goals: 1) Identify and address anomalies in statutes & 2) Address statutes
 which may provide penalties which are inconsistent with evidence based
 practices, including double enhanced drug crimes, significant expansion of

- drug free zones, collateral consequences of convictions, human trafficking, rape kit processing, stolen property database.
- Update: Coordinated with CCJJ on HB348, which addressed drug free zone enhancements, drug penalties, and evidence based practices generally. Met with Senator Hillyard and AOC, but could not reach agreement on collateral consequences of convictions notice. HB252 addressed human trafficking. Subcommittee also met with Rep. Ray regarding HB11, but could not reach agreement on death penalty legislation.

Guidelines Subcommittee

- Goals: 1) To address revision of the Sentencing Guidelines' philosophical approach; 2) Incorporation of evidence-based practices into the Guidelines; and 3) To incorporate 2014 Legislative amendments.
- Update: Coordinated with CCJJ on HB348 on incorporation of evidence-based practices generally and revisions to the Guidelines. Philosophical approach statement has not been updated. Prefatory language to include evidence based practices updated with brief statement, needs further elaboration consistent with HB348. Significant revisions anticipated consistent with HB348.

- Update: HB348 addressed this issue in detail. Implementation pilot in 2nd District April 1 June 30; feedback to Board of District Court Judges expected at July meeting. *Time-sensitive deadlines in HB348 for implementation.
